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Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal and ensure progress for those who are already high attainers. We wish to increase the enrichment opportunities within our curriculum so that all pupils access a broad, balanced and ambitious curriculum.

We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who live in poor quality accommodation. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery, notably in the targeted support delivered by support staff for pupils whose education has been worst affected, including non-disadvantaged pupils.

We need to respond to data patterns in our school. Year 1 phonics outcomes were way down on last year. We will need to ensure that early reading is given the highest priority on the school development plan going forward. In 2022/23 we want to secure much higher results in Ks1 phonics outcomes and Y2 phonics resits. We also want to see an improved percentage of children reaching the ELG for word reading and comprehension in Reception class.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, rooted in robust assessment and knowledge of the pupils.

St. Josephs key principles of our strategy plan are:

- To reduce the deficit that both Covid-19 and FSM-Ever 6 has on our pupils in the core curriculum areas of reading, writing and mathematics
- **To improve provision and outcomes in Early Years.**

- To develop and further enhance pupils' life experiences and enrichment activities linked to the curriculum so that learning is memorable
- To ensure that pupils have access to the necessary resources to overcome barriers to learning
- To ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they are set
- To act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- To ensure pupils' have access to mental health and well being support where needed.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments, observations and discussions with pupils indicate limited oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many pupils. This is evident from Reception through to KS2.
2	Assessments, observations and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantaged pupils generally have greater difficulties with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers.
3	Internal and external (where available) assessments indicate that reading, writing and maths attainment among disadvantaged pupils is below that of non-disadvantaged pupils, particularly at 'transition points' (Yr 1 from EYs, Yr 3 from KS1, Yr 5 from LKS2).
4	Our assessments and observations indicate that the education and wellbeing of many of our disadvantaged pupils have been impacted by partial school closures to a greater extent than for other pupils. These findings are supported by national studies. This has resulted in gaps in knowledge leading to pupils falling further behind age-related expectations, especially in maths and writing.
5	Our assessments, observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils, notably due to a lack of enrichment opportunities during school closure and difficulties accessing home learning / remote learning online. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils. Referrals for support have increased during the pandemic. The demand for counselling has increased with counselling capacity increased by 50% to accommodate demand. All children benefit from additional support in class, receiving small group interventions.

6	<p>Our attendance data over the 3 years prior to 2019-20 showed an improving trend with attendance reaching above 96%. Attendance in 2019-20 and 2020-21 fell just below 96%.</p> <p>The number of persistent absentees was a falling trend prior to 2019-20 however this number rose significantly in 2019-20. Our assessments and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting pupils' progress.</p>

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 - 2022 academic year.

Our internal assessments during 2021/22 suggests that the performance of pupils was is still lower than 2019 (pre-covid data) however it shows a strengthening trend.

PP children in Y6 performed less well than non PP children in Reading, Writing and Maths.

The data shows that PP children performed as well if not better in Reading, Writing and Maths in Years 1, 3, 4 and 5. However the data shows that PP children are not performing as well at the end of key stages. Pupil progress reviews will take place within the first half of the Autumn term and PP children will be identified and tracked. Interventions will take place to address this data.

Attendance remains a focus of our current plan as we recognise the importance of good attendance for all pupils. Our aim is to raise recover school attendance to 97% and to reduce the number of pupils whose attendance falls below 90% and are therefore identified as 'persistent absentees'

Our assessments and observations indicated that pupil behaviour, wellbeing and mental health were significantly impacted last year. We used pupil premium funding to provide wellbeing support for pupils, and targeted interventions where required (Autumn and Spring Term). We are building on that approach with the activities detailed in this plan. Staff have noted that throughout the academic year 2021 - 2022, since returning to more usual daily routines, behaviour is noticeably improved compared to pre-pandemic. Pupil's team work, peer support and consideration for the well-being of others is tangible

ST JOSEPH'S PUPIL PREMIUM REVIEW (2022/23)

The school have continued to use funding to support the wider curriculum which is central to the mission of the school. Our catchment is typically much disadvantaged than the vast majority of schools. We therefore plan in a high number of visits for the children and visitors to give them the experiences that they are typically lacking. Examples (not exhaustive)

- Heavily subsidised residential trip in Year 6
- Partnership with Countryside Trust
- Visits to safety works
- CPR training
- Careers day
- Languages day
- Zoolab visit
- Visits to art gallery
- Numerous visits supporting wider curriculum
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In addition, our Pupil Premium fund allows us to employ extra staffing to cope with challenges that children have so that they can achieve well. We have:

- Non class based SENCO
- Nurture group
- All other classes have Teaching Assistant (at least one)
- Additional classroom support in Ks1 focussing on lower readers
- Family support officer who gives fantastic support
- Attendance officer
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OUTCOMES:

Outcomes have been strong for our disadvantaged children particularly as they get further up the school.

KEY STAGE 2:

In Key Stage 2, exactly half of the class (15 children) are in receipt of Pupil Premium. This is slightly more than the general school context. Results were mainly positive with some areas for further improvement.

In reading, 80% of Pupil Premium children met the Expected Standard against 61% of Pupil Premium children nationally. This represents a great success. Similarly, 33% reached 'Greater Depth' against 18% nationally. Reading has been a huge focus on the school so we were delighted with this outcome. Progress scores in reading among the disadvantaged children was +1.91 against a national figure of -0.82.

In writing, 87% of the disadvantaged children reached the 'Expected Standard' against 59% nationally. 20% reached 'Greater Depth' against 7% nationally. The school's progress figure in Writing was +3.17 well above the national figure of -0.64.

In Maths, 73% of the disadvantaged children within the cohort met the 'Expected Standard'. This exceeded figures within our own school context of non-disadvantaged children and also exceeded to overall national figure of 59%. 47% of the cohort reached Greater Depth against a national figure of 13%. This is an excellent result for the school. Progress figures in Maths for the disadvantaged was + 2.55. The national figure was -0.98. As a school, we were delighted with this outcome.

KEY STAGE 1: In Year 2, the school has a very low attaining year group – comfortably the lowest in the school. Many of the children, all disadvantaged, joined the school in the back end of Year 1 into Year 2 as the cohort rose very quickly from 21 to 30.

In reading, 57% of the PP children achieved the 'Expected Standard' compared to 54% of children nationally. 3% reached 'Greater Depth' against 9% nationally.

In writing, 50% of the children in receipt of Pupil Premium achieved the 'Expected Standard' against 60% nationally. 0 reached the higher standard against 8% nationally.

In maths, 60% of children reached the Expected Standard against 71% nationally. 17% reached 'Greater Depth' against 16% nationally.

Therefore, in all areas, in a very poor year group. Pupil Premium children at St Joseph's were slightly below counterparts nationally. The context of the year group has had a large bearing on this as listed above.

ATTENDANCE: Attendance at St Joseph's is always a challenge. The school are broadly matching the national average in terms of both overall attendance and national averages. Disadvantaged attendance is significantly above Pupil Premium children nationally. The school is underperforming slightly with non-disadvantaged children when compared with national averages.

We use funding to employ an attendance officer. We also have fully funded attendance prizes to give attendance as high a profile as possible. This is still an ongoing battle for the school, particularly post pandemic where Reception and Year 1 figures are extremely low.
